KAPLAN HIGH SCHOOL, #6981 presents *The Wrangler Roy Show* written by STUART L. SHEELEY and directed by Erika Trahan. Fri 3:00p-3:20p **Suitable for all ages**; Lovable kid show host Wrangler Roy entertains kids of all ages.

DUTCHTOWN, #7343 presents *Next to Normal Musical* written by Brian Yorkey and directed by Shannon Ehrmann. Fri 3:25p-3:45p **Mature Content**; The story centers on a mother who struggles with worsening bipolar disorder and the effects that managing her illness has on her family.

HAHNVILLE HIGH SCHOOL, #7313 presents *Matilda The Musical*, written by Tim Minchin, Dennis Kelly and directed by Megan Harms. Fri 3:50p-4:10p **Suitable for all ages**; Matilda is a little girl with astonishing wit, intelligence and psychokinetic powers. She's unloved by her cruel parents but impresses her schoolteacher, the highly loveable Miss Honey. Over the course of her first term at school, Matilda and Miss Honey have a profound effect on each other's lives, as Miss Honey begins not only to recognize but also appreciate Matilda's extraordinary personality. Matilda's school life isn't completely smooth sailing, however – the school's mean headmistress, Miss Trunchbull, hates children and just loves thinking up new punishments for those who don't abide by her rules. But Matilda has courage and cleverness in equal amounts, and could be the school pupils' saving grace!

LOUISIANA SCHOOL FOR MATH, SCIENCE, AND THE ARTS, #7745 presents *Men On Boats* written by Jaclyn Backhaus and directed by Scott Theriot. Fri 4:15p-4:35p **Strong Language**; Ten Explorers. Four Boats. One Grand Canyon. Men On Boats is the true(ish) story of an 1869 expedition, when a one-armed captain and a crew of insane yet loyal volunteers set out to chart a course of the Colorado River.

NORTHSHORE HIGH SCHOOL, #7333 presents *Clue On Stage: High School Edition* written by Jonathan Lynn, Hunter Foster, Eric Price & Sandy Rustin and directed by Larry Johnson. Fri 4:40p-5:00p **Suitable for all ages**; Based on the iconic 1985 Paramount movie which was inspired by the classic Hasbro board game, Clue is a hilarious farce-meets-murder mystery. The tale begins at a remote mansion, where six mysterious guests assemble for an unusual dinner party where murder and blackmail are on the menu. When their host turns up dead, they all become suspects. Led by the Wadsworth – the butler, Miss Scarlett, Professor Plum, Mrs. White, Mr. Green, Mrs. Peacock and Colonel Mustard race to find the killer as the body count stacks up. Clue is the comedy whodunit that will leave both cult-fans and newcomers in stitches as they try to figure out...WHO did it, WHERE, and with WHAT!

LIVE OAK HIGH SCHOOL, #5882 presents *Oz* written by Don Zolidis and directed by Abigail Moonshower. Fri 5:00p-5:20p **Suitable for all ages**; Reeling from her sister's death, Beth suddenly finds herself journeying through a world suspiciously resembling the film The Wizard of Oz. But with the yellow brick road sold to foreign investors after a financial meltdown, the Scarecrow reveling in his ignorant bliss, the Cowardly Lion acting like a paranoid sociopath, and the Tin Man embracing his emotional numbness, Beth wonders what role she plays in this classic story gone awry. A hilarious and heart-wrenching exploration of grief and perseverance on the road to acceptance.

ABRAMSON SCI ACADEMY, presents *columbinus* written by PJ Paparelli and Stephen Karam and directed by Robert Bassler. Fri 5:22p-5:42p **Strong Language, Mature Content**; columbinus is a play written by Stephen Karam and PJ Paparelli, with contributions by Josh Barrett, Sean McNall, Karl Miller, Michael Milligan and Will Rogers, created by the United States Theatre Project. The play looks at issues of alienation, hostility and social pressure in high schools and was suggested by the April 1999 massacre at Columbine High School in Jefferson County, Colorado.

ST. AMANT HIGH, #7701 presents *Lockdown* written by Douglas Craven and directed by Heidi Frederic. Fri 5:44p-6:04p **Strong Language, Mature Content**; In a dark classroom, eight students sit in an "official lockdown," not knowing if it's just a drill or an actual emergency. When a hysterical younger girl bolts from the room and the teacher follows, the remaining students are left alone to decide if it's safer to stay or run.

MANDEVILLE HIGH SCHOOL, #1510 presents *The Female Edison* written by Lindsay Price and directed by Cherie Ducote Firmin. Fri 8:30p-9:00p **Suitable for all ages**; The Female Edison - In the 19th century, the patterns of life were often rigid and unchanging. So how does a young teenage girl not only invent a safety part for a power loom, but get the mill manager to implement it into factory machines? That's exactly what Margaret E. Knight, who ended up with 89 inventions and over 20 patents over her life, did at 12 years old. How did she break the pattern?

CHRIST EPISCOPAL SCHOOL, #8387 presents *Bury The Dead* written by Irwin Shaw and directed by Anne-Liese Juge Fox. Fri 9:05p-9:40p **Suitable for all ages**; During the second year of the war that is to begin tomorrow night, six dead soldiers rise up asking to be allowed to rejoin the living. It contemplates death and challenges war practices.

CADDO MAGNET HIGH SCHOOL, #3594 presents *Hairspray* (selections) written by Mark O'Donnell & Thomas Meehan and directed by Patti Reeves. Fri 9:45p-10:30p **Suitable for all ages**; Tracy Turnblad is an unconventional heroine. Despite not having a perfect figure, she gets on a "Teen TV show in 1962 and turns things upside down. She manages to get the station to integrate and she gets the guy.

SLIDELL HIGH SCHOOL, #775 presents *Matilda* written by Kelly & Minchin and directed by Scott Sauber. Sat 9:40a-10:00a **Suitable for all ages**; Matilda is a mistreated girl in a tough school situation because of nasty parents and a nasty principal that triumphs by using her love for reading and her imagination.

MOUNT CARMEL ACADEMY, #2075 presents *Back Cover* written by Emily Hageman and directed by Jessica Duplantis. Sat 12:45p-1:20p **Suitable for all ages**; The unexpected divorce of Madison's parents relocated her to New York City—a place that she has vowed to loathe. Through incredible coincidence, Madison finds a shoebox full of letters belonging to a young woman named Jessica. A connection is formed that will forever change the course of Madison's life. Narrated by Madison's older self, Back Cover is a story of loss, courage, humanity, and the painful—but wonderful—experience of growing up.

PLAQUEMINE HIGH SCHOOL, #8580 presents *OTHELLO: THE REMIX* written by THE Q BOTHERS and directed by TIM SANDIFER. Sat 1:25p-1:40p **Mature Content**; Othello is spun out and lyrically rewritten over original beats in this high-energy spin on Shakespeare's play, proving that the Bard himself was the original master of rhythm and rhyme.

ARCHBISHOP RUMMEL HIGH SCHOOL, #8460 presents *An Experiment* written by Brent Holland and directed by Carol Eshleman. Sat 1:45p-2:15p **Mature Content**; 5 test subjects awake to find out that they are part of an unknown experiment, but none of them can remember any of their lives before awaking. They find they have name tags on not with their names but with personality traits. The experiment, they discover, is to see if their true selves will be revealed, but which of them will live to see the end of it?
